# Eagleview Middle School: Incoming 7th Grade Summer 2017 Reading \& Project Info 

The teachers and administrators of Eagleview Middle School recognize the important role that reading plays in student achievement. Therefore, each summer, all students are required to read two books from the summer reading list and complete one project.

All incoming $7^{\text {th }}$ grade students must read The Outsiders, by S.E. Hinton. This book will become the foundation for class lectures and discussions of literary elements such as plot, character, setting, conflict, and theme.

Additionally, all incoming $7^{\text {th }}$ grade students must choose one appropriate novel to read (150+ pages) and may choose from the Suggested Reading list provided below and create a brochure demonstrating their understanding of the text and the literary elements it contains.

The project will be turned in to the student's Language Arts teacher by Friday, September 1 ${ }^{\text {st }}, \mathbf{2 0 1 7}$. Teachers will use the attached rubric to assess the brochure for the choice book (not The Outsiders).

This project will be part of the student's first quarter grade in Language Arts. Evaluation of the "Required" book will be at the discretion of the Language Arts teacher, and will also be reflected in the first quarter grade.

## Project Requirements

Use a piece of $81 / 2 \times 11$ paper to create a brochure that depicts the six literary elements of the book you read From the Free Reading List. Fold the paper into thirds so that you have three panels. Use the front and the back of the paper to complete each section of the brochure as described below. Each section, except the cover, should be clearly labeled as: Setting,
Characterization, Plot, Conflict and Point of View, and Theme. Use the maximum amount of space available in each panel so that the brochure is visually interesting as well as informative. Pictures may be drawn or cut from other sources. You may also choose to use a computer program to assist you in the layout.
The panels of the brochure should be completed according to the directions below. Please refer to Literary Terms (below) to insure that you understand each element of the project.

1. Panel 1: Cover of the brochure. This section will include the title and author of the book, your name, and the date. Also include some type of visual image on the cover that would entice the reader to look further.
2. Panel 2: Setting - This panel should include a visual representation or picture of the setting of the book and a few sentences describing the setting.
3. Panel 3: Character and Point of View - This panel should include two pictures or symbolic images that characterize two important characters with a one or two sentence caption for each picture. Put the character's name at the top of each picture. Also, this panel should explain from which point of view ( 1 st, $2^{\text {nd }}$, or $3^{\text {rd }}$ person) the story is told, and how it impacts the story. 4. Panel 4: Plot - This panel should explain three main events of the plot of the book, and tell why they're important to the story.
4. Panel 5: Conflict- This panel should use pictures to depict the main conflict of the book and how it is resolved. It should also include a few sentences that identify the type of conflict, explain the conflict, and tell how it was resolved.
5. Panel 6: Theme - This panel should explain a major theme of the book, providing examples from the text for support. If the book were teaching a lesson, what would the lesson be?

## Literary Terms:

1. Characterization: The characters in the story and how the author describes them (speech, thoughts, actions, effect on others, and looks).
2. Setting: The time, place, and circumstances in which the story takes place.
3. Plot: The events that make up the story, including the exposition, rising action, climax, falling action, and resolution.
4. Conflict: A struggle or problem that is happening in the story. The types of conflict are: Man vs. Man—A character is struggling with another character, Man vs. Society-A character is struggling with more than one person, Man vs. Nature-A character is struggling with a force of nature, Man vs. Self-A character is struggling with an internal problem, Man vs.
Technology-A character is fighting some aspect of science or technology, and Man vs. the Unknown-A character isn't sure what they're up against, like a mystery or the supernatural.
5. Point of View: The person telling the story (a character or an outside narrator) and their perspective of the events; Point of view is either first person (I, me, my), second person (you, yours), or third person (he, she, they, it).
6. Theme: The lessons about life that the author teaches through the story. For example: The value of friendship. NOT THE SAME AS THE GENRE OF THE NOVEL.
